



## Upstate Update

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## Poverty

Poverty represents a challenge to the promise of America, a challenge that has been growing in the wake of the 2008 - 2009 recession. According to official government reports, poverty increased in each year of the past four years, and currently stands at 46.2 million people living below the poverty line, \$22,314 a year for a family of four. Of those living below the poverty line, nearly half (20.5 million), live below the "deep poverty" line, equal to \$11,157 for a family of four. 7.4 million children are in families with incomes below the deep poverty line. Upstate New York includes communities historically challenged by high poverty rates including old industrial cities (Buffalo, Rochester, Syracuse, Binghamton, and Utica), and areas classified within the Appalachian Region (Southern Tier and Western Catskill counties). For this reason New York State represents an important front in the fight to contain, and ultimately eliminate, poverty from America.
