James R. Richards Memorial Feline Lecture

The James R. Richards Memorial Feline Lecture Series was established to honor the outstanding contributions the late Dr. James R. Richards made to the field of feline medicine. Dr. Richards was Director of the Cornell Feline Health Center from 1997 until his death in 2007, and was Past President of the American Association of Feline Practitioners. Donations from his many friends and colleagues to the James R. Richards Memorial Fund were placed in an endowment at Cornell University, and the income from the Fund supports the memorial lectures in perpetuity. Each year, a series of state-of-the-art lectures on various areas of feline medicine are held at the College of Veterinary Medicine, at the Fall New York State Veterinary Conference, and at the annual Fred Scott Feline Symposium. As all who knew him agree, there is no finer way to support Dr. Richards' passion for cats and for education than by making it possible, through these memorial lectures, for leaders in feline medicine to share the newest and most pertinent information directly with veterinarians (and future veterinarians) working each day to improve the lives of cats everywhere.

Dr. Danny Scott, DACVP, will offer this year's lecture, **Diagnosis and Management** of the Cat with Atopic Dermatitis. Dr. Scott is a 1971 graduate of the University of California, Davis. He is currently James Law Professor of Dermatology and Co-Chief of the Dermatology Service at Cornell University. He is a diplomat of the American College of Veterinary Pathologists. Dr. Scott's duties include clinical service; teaching veterinary students and residents in dermatology and pathology; diagnostic dermatopathology; clinical and dermatopathologic research; consultations for area veterinarians; various committees. He has authored or co-authored over 630 publications and given over 450 continuing education presentations around the world.

The John W. Whitefield'65 Surgical Short Course

This course will be taught by Dr. Julia Sumner and small animal surgical residents from Cornell University Hospital for Animals. This course honors Dr. Whitefield's pioneering application of surgical expertise to clinical practice and recognizes his many contributions to the advancement of small animal surgery as well as his lifelong commitment to helping clients and patients. This year's surgical short course will focus on soft tissue tension management and skin flaps.

The Chester Hartenstein DVM '45 Memorial Lecture Series

Established in 2005, this memorial provides support for an annual lecture that focuses on neurological diseases in small and large animals.

After graduating in 1945 from Cornell's College of Veterinary Medicine, Dr. Hartenstein remained dedicated, committed and affiliated with the college throughout his life. During his entire clinical career, he thrived on teaching, communicating and instilling the highest standards of practice for the veterinary community. He was dedicated and devoted for 32 years of clinical practice in both large and small veterinary medicine. The "art and science" of this field was embedded and ever present throughout his entire professional career. Dr. Hartenstein passed away in 2001, his wife Florence in 2014 and they are survived by two sons, Steven and Robert. Because of family illness, they were very in tune with the idea that research in animal medicine has an impact on human medicine and wanted to focus on exposing students to this type of learning.

Cornell University faculty will present a morning of small animal neurology focused lectures in honor of Dr. Hartenstein.


