GOOD OL' DOG AND CAT FUND LECTURE SERIES

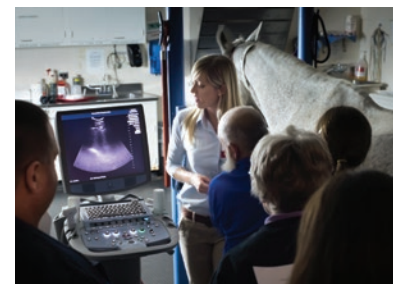

EDUCATION HIGHLIGHTS

EQUINE PROGRAM AND LARGE ANIMAL EMERGENCY RESCUE

This expanded program includes a mix of lectures and laboratories including: managing strangles outbreaks and ultrasound guided injections of the cervical vertebrae. Of special note, Dr. Rebecca Gimenez will present her Command System related to Technical Large Animal Emergency Rescue (TLAER) work in conjunction with



the Donkey Welfare Symposium on Sunday. TLAER includes the practical considerations, behavioral understanding, specialty equipment, techniques, methodologies and tactics behind the safe extrication of a live large animal from entrapments in local emergencies and disaster areas. Lectures and labs will focus on the roles of the veterinarian, owner, emergency responders and others involved in large animal rescue operations, as well as emergency and disaster scenarios and response. The TLAER program is included with full conference registration or can be selected for a \$250 fee for Sunday only.

John Rossmeisl, DVM, MS, DACVIM, Professor of Neurology and Neurosurgery at the Virginia-Maryland College of Veterinary Medicine, will offer six lectures focused on the most common neurologic challenges of dogs and cats.

Established in 2005, this memorial to Dr. Hartenstein, a mixed animal practitioner for 32 years, provides support for an annual lecture that focuses on neurological diseases in small and large animals.

CONTINUING EDUCATION INFORMATION

New York State Continuing Education Credit

Each individual is responsible for maintaining personal records of continuing education for six years from the date of the course.
