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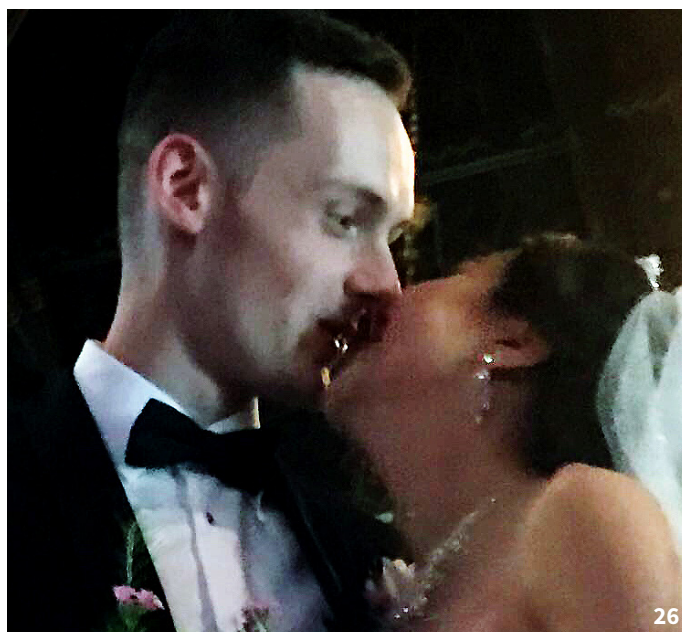
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An International Northcote

Message from Our Corporation Board President

The 2017-2018 Fiscal Academic Year is quickly coming to an end. The year began with the Kitchen Renovation, arguably the most important and necessary project in Acacia's history. No other room in Acacia had ever needed an overhaul more. The project was completed on time by Canzler Contracting using local subcontractors. The stainless steel fixtures (cabinets, pot rack, countertops, sinks, backsplashes, wall panels etc.) were purchased through local commercial kitchen vendor B&W Supply. A shout out to the other three members of the Kitchen Renovation Project Committee: chairman Sho Iketani '15 (1175), Richie Corrales '12 (1137), and Tom Schultz '15 (1181).

The renovation began Monday, June 13, 2017 and ended August 21, 2017. The wall and ceiling coverings were all removed, with only the studs remaining. All electrical and plumbing (water, waste, and natural gas) was being replaced. A new grease trap was installed in the concrete floor, near the window. The locations of the pot sink and vegetable (prep) sink were swapped, resulting in a more logical layout. New sinks are replaced the 55 year old antiques. A quarry tile floor was installed. New LED lights replaced the ancient fluorescent fixtures. One of the doors between the kitchen and dining room was eliminated, as was the pass-through. Stainless steel cabinets and countertops were installed. An under-counter cooler was installed so all of the Actives' refrigerated items are stored where they use them and away from the food items our cook, Giovanni, uses to prepare epicurean delights.

We had hoped to purchase a convection oven, but the alumni financial support of this project fell short of our goal and we had substantial cost overruns, and thus this purchase has been postponed. I continue to be puzzled by the majority of our 600+ alumni choosing to NOT even pay their annual dues (via snail-mail or PayPal www.paypal.com to AcaciaCorpBoard@cornell.edu. Please pay through "Instant Transfer" to avoid any fees). We need your financial assistance, and we need it now. I realize some percentage of you might have financial, personal, or health issues, but not 75% of you! To those 144 alumni who generously donated to the Kitchen Renovation, a heartfelt thank you! A beautiful (and heavy) stainless steel plaque now hangs proudly in the main foyer and acknowledges those who contributed at least \$100 during the campaign. And, a huge THANK YOU to Stanley Niman '73 (783) and Jerry Kreider '68 (720) who spent countless hours tracking down Alumni from their eras and persuading many of them to financially support the Kitchen Renovation Project.

The Active Chapter continues to survive in an ever-changing fraternity system at Cornell. The house is still not completely filled, nor will it be in the fall. However, they have recently initiated a fine group of seven new Brothers, all freshman. I remain optimistic about Acacia's future.

Please email or call me if you have comments, concerns, suggestions, want to get involved, or simply want to say hello. It would be wonderful if I heard from some of you so I know you are as concerned, yet encouraged, as I am about the future of our beloved Acacia. The Mailbag column continues to be short of news to share! Certainly there must be news (good and bad), so please share it.

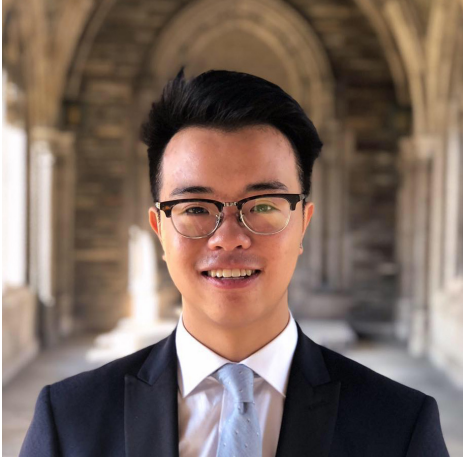

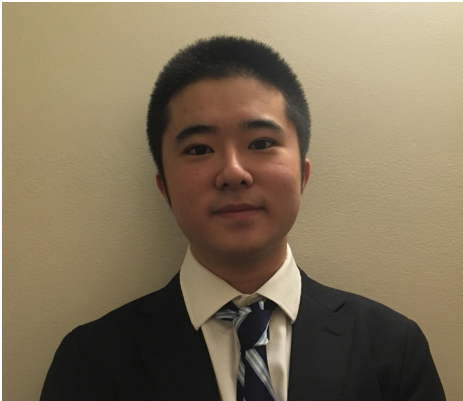
New Brothers

The commons fireplace has been brought back into use with the finding of a cache of logs suitable for firewood behind the toolshed. There have been, as always, a number of projects spearheaded by Steve Stein (787). The Kitchen Renovation donors' plaque is mounted by the front entrance along with two Brother Tree plaques. 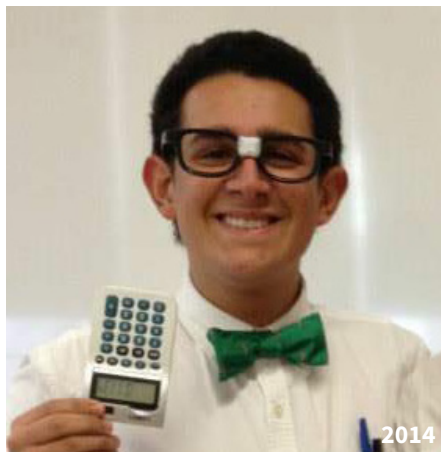

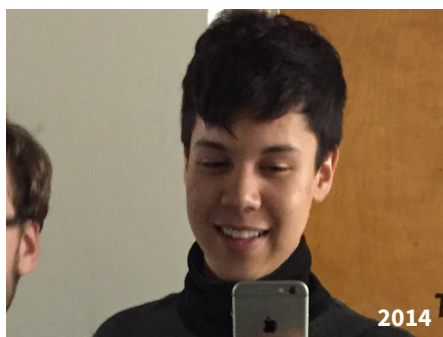
JOSHUA YOHANCE BENJAMIN BRISCOE (1208) '18

BYUNG HEE CHUN (1187) '18

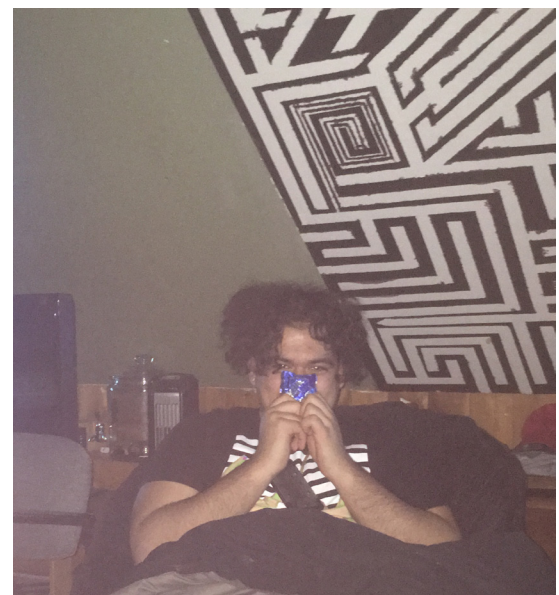

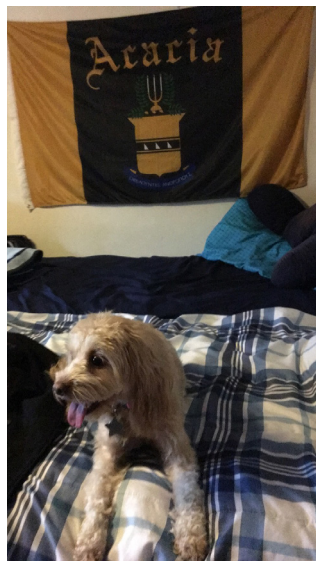
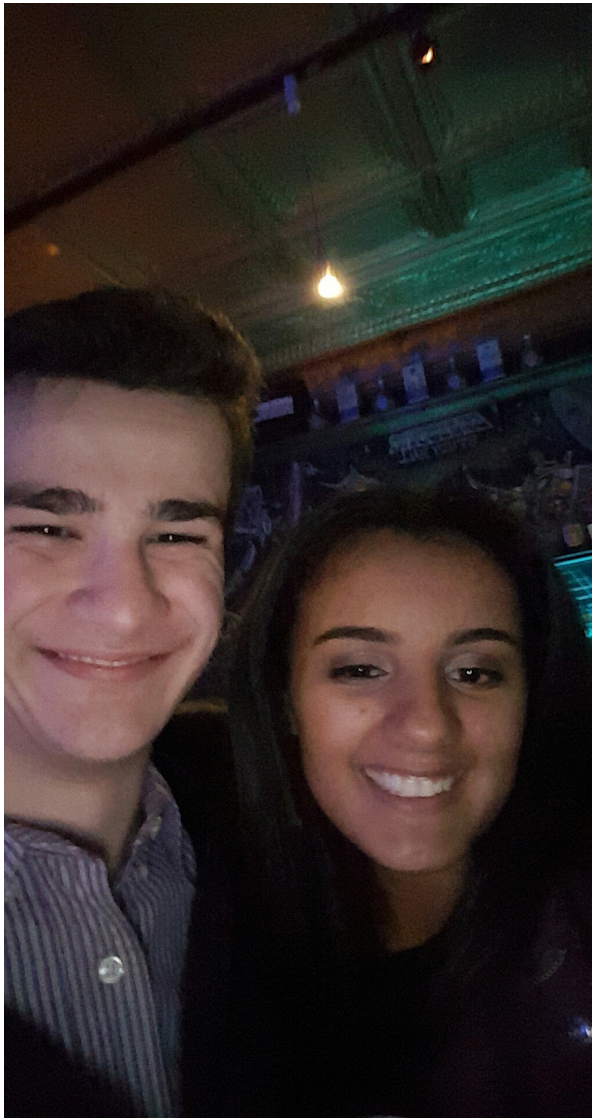
