FORMS OF BEQUEST

GENERAL BEQUEST

I hereby give, devise, and bequeath to Cornell University, at Ithaca, N. Y., the sum of Dollars.

FOR THE ENDOWMENT OF A PROFESSORSHIP

I hereby give, devise, and bequeath to Cornell University, at Ithaca, N. Y., the sum of Dollars as an endowment for a professorship in said University, the income from which said sum is to be used each year towards the payment of the salary of a professor or professors of said institution.

FOR A SCHOLARSHIP

I hereby give, devise, and bequeath to Cornell University, at Ithaca, N. Y., the sum of Dollars, the income from which sum is to be used each year in the payment of an undergraduate scholarship in said University, to be known as the scholarship.

FOR A PARTICULAR PURPOSE DESIGNATED BY THE TESTATOR

I hereby give, devise, and bequeath to Cornell University, at Ithaca, N. Y., the sum of Dollars to be used [or, the income from which said sum is to be used each year] for the purpose of

REPORT OF THE COMPTROLLER

To the Board of Trustees of Cornell University:

I have the honor to submit herewith the financial statement of Cornell University covering the fiscal year July 1, 1926, to June 30, 1927, inclusive.

INCOME AND EXPENSE

The cost of conducting the endowed colleges at Ithaca during the year exceeded the available income by \$80,218, thereby increasing the accumulated deficit to \$461,545.63. The Trustees appropriated to apply on this deficit \$50,000 from profits received from securities sold during the year, thus reducing the debit balance of the income account to \$411,545.63. Of this deficit accumulated during the past few years something over \$136,000 resulted from the purchase of land bordering upon the campus and desired by the University to protect or supplement the existing campus; \$78,000 was for the equipment of new buildings; and the balance from the ordinary running expenses of the University. The year's deficit was caused in part by unexpected demands arising during the year and an over-estimate of some items of income. The largest single item was a decrease of about \$35,000 in tuition and fees from students. The greater part of this occurred in the second semester and is apparently due to the growing policy of limiting registrations.

In the Medical College in New York City the cash deficit for the year was \$44,297.38, but a marked decrease in the estimate of re-appropriations necessary to meet outstanding obligations of \$61,486.89 caused the year to end with a credit balance of \$17,189.31, reducing the total accumulated deficit in income to \$211,493.38. This deficit has resulted largely from the failure of income from a million and a half dollars of International Traction Company bonds given by Colonel Payne for the endowment of the college. During this year, through the generous action of a friend of the University who desires to remain anonymous, \$750,000 has been realized upon these securities, and the loss of \$750,000 has been written off from the Medical College endowment.

For accounting purposes the University is separated into six divisions: (A) the endowed colleges in Ithaca, (B) the Medical College in New York, (C) the Veterinary College, (D) the College of Agriculture, (E) the College of Home Economics, and (F) the State Experiment Station at Geneva, N. Y. In subdivision A, which for accounting purposes may be termed the University, are included many general items of income and expense which inure to the benefit, in a varying degree, of the five other divisions, or to the use and benefit of the students registered in the colleges constituting those divisions. Some such items are the expense of the general administrative offices, the library, the infirmary, the residential halls, and the departments of music, hygiene, and military and physical training. A summary statement of the financial results of the year of these several subdivisions is shown in Schedule A on page 7.

THE UNIVERSITY ENDOWMENT

The permanent endowment or income-producing funds of the University aggregate \$19,405,426.63, of which nearly \$15,000,000 are for the benefit of the University at Ithaca and \$4,456,176.79 for the Medical College in New York City. A list of these funds with the purposes for which each fund is expended, and the income received during the year is shown in Schedule C, page 11. The investment of these funds so as to produce the highest rate of interest compatible with safety is one of the important duties of the Trustees, and the Finance Committee, to which this duty is entrusted, has been remarkably successful. Where securities are given to the University for the benefit of specific funds they are held as constituting the investment of such fund. Except where special restrictions require that the principal and interest on gifts to the University be kept separate from other funds, all investments are regarded as made for the University as a whole, and the annual income arising from such investments, after the deduction of two per cent of the income as an insurance reserve against losses, is distributed pro rata among the several specific funds, held by and being the property of the University.

Some years ago the Trustees decided that in the investment of university funds the committee should not be confined to so-called trust fund investments, but that its members should use their best judgment. Realizing that losses would occasionally occur, provision was made for an insurance reserve fund, above mentioned, and this fund, with the occasional use of a portion of the profits realized from bonds sold, has been more than adequate to care for the losses incurred. The endowment funds thus constitute an investment trust. The securities purchased are distributed over a wide range of industries and organizations. The usual investment is from \$25,000 to \$50,000 in an issue, which means only one-fourth or one-half of one per cent of the entire funds. A list of securities in which the funds are invested will be found in Schedule VII of the Treasurer's report appended hereto, page 75.

The average rate of return received upon the investments during the past year and credited to the several funds was 5.53 per cent, and the market valuation of the securities, excluding gifts, exceeded the book value, which is usually the cost value or market value on April 1, 1923, when our present system was installed, by nearly \$1,000,000.

During the past three years, from the net profits received on securities paid or sold after adequate charge-offs, \$126,000 has been transferred to the income account of the University toward reducing the deficit therein, and about \$93,000.00 added to the insurance reserve account, which now amounts to \$145,756.55. Thus the integrity of the endowment funds seems well secured against any probable business depression.

SEMI-CENTENNIAL ENDOWMENT FUND

The subscriptions (exclusive of gifts for special purposes, such as buildings, which, under the resolution of the Board of Trustees, form part of the Semi-Centennial Endowment Fund) secured by the Semi-Centennial Endowment Committee aggregate \$6,651,598.67.

Of these uncollected subscriptions \$829,402.70 are from the classes of 1920-23 inclusive, payable through the Cornellian Council, and not yet due; \$1,296,331.32 are payable at the convenience of the donor; and \$142,306.73 are payable at definite dates which have not yet been reached. This leaves a balance of only \$291,087.06 of subscriptions which by their terms, have matured but have not yet been paid. During the year, in addition to \$27,869.61 paid through the Cornellian Council, there was paid into the University, on account of the principal of subscriptions \$125,116.25. Of this amount \$23,403.28 was paid on account of principal maturing prior to the beginning of the year; \$21,219.31 on principal maturing during the year; and \$80,493.66 on account of subscriptions not yet matured or payable at convenience. Interest amounting to \$42,691.75 was collected. Ninety-six extensions of time of payment were granted and eighty-nine subscriptions were paid in full. Further details of these subscriptions are shown in Schedule D, page 36.

GIFTS

The gifts received by the University during the year that were recorded in this office aggregated \$1,800,321.50. Many gifts were undoubtedly made direct to departments and did not pass through our books.

The activities and loyal service of the Cornellian Council, and of the many alumni cooperating with it, have continued during the year. The success of their efforts is attested by the total amount turned over to the University of \$394,678.32 as compared with \$246,159.60 received the previous year. The amount received for unrestricted use for current expenses increased from \$107,602 to \$116,137.82.

A detailed list of the gifts received through the Cornellian Council is shown in Schedule E on page 38. There are four items of special interest, however, to which I call attention, to wit: the continuation of Colonel Sackett's generous gifts making possible the beautifying of the Fall Creek and Cascadilla gorges bounding the campus; the completion of the John E. Sweet professorship fund of \$200,000 com-

menced during the Semi-Centennial Endowment Campaign; the provision by the heirs of the late Mathias Arnot of a forest of 1700 acres for the use of the Department of Forestry in the College of Agriculture; and the successful campaign of the committee under the leadership of Mr. R. E. Treman, '09, making possible the erection of the War Memorial Towers as a continuing reminder of those sons of Cornell who gave their lives in the World War. These particular activities of the Council are of great value to the University, but the project which has the first appeal to those charged with the immediate administration of the University is the steadily growing amount of unrestricted income available to the Trustees to meet the University's current needs.

The donations other than those received through the Cornellian Council and the Semi-Centennial Endowment Campaign aggregate \$437,313.34 and are listed in Schedule F on page 39. They show the growing interest of the alumni and of the public in the welfare of the University. They range from \$130,000 to establish a professorship to a \$5.00 addition to a book purchasing fund as a memorial to a faithful and beloved professor. They include a number of scholarships established by alumni and groups of alumni, loan funds, research funds, and provision for the upkeep and improvement of the physical plant. One of the most interesting items is the establishment by a large number of beekeepers of a fund to provide for the purchase of books relating to apiculture. Many of these gifts are profits received from a particular hive of bees designated for this purpose.

THE PHYSICAL PLANT

The only large addition to the physical plant completed during the year is the new range of greenhouses east of the Judd Falls road for the use of the College of Agriculture. These greenhouses were constructed by the State at a cost of \$173,842.

During recent years the increase in the provision of facilities for the better housing and care of the student body has been steady and rapid. In 1912 the only student dormitory was Sage College, where approximately 150 women secured room and board. Since that time the halls of residence have increased so that in the year just passed 1,048 students were provided with rooms, and in the various cafeterias and dining rooms, excluding the Home Economics cafeteria which is conducted by that department, 1,160,885 meals were served.

The administration, care and upkeep of the residential halls and the activities incident to the personal welfare of the students have greatly increased the responsibilities of the administrative staff of the University. The successful manner in which the work is generally carried on is a source of great satisfaction to me.

It is with deepest regret I report that on account of her health Miss Harriet Sutherland, who since 1907 has served the University as Superintendent of the Infirmary, has tendered her resignation to take effect on November 1 next. Miss Sutherland is another one

of those administrative officers who have done so much for the welfare of the University and of the student body. Her fine character, her high ideals, and her sympathetic nature have endeared her to the student body, and particularly to the parents of those students who have been seriously ill. Miss Sutherland's successor will be Miss Alice V. Newton, whose experience as superintendent of nurses and of the training school of the Clifton Springs Sanitarium indicates that the infirmary will continue to be conducted upon the high plane set by Miss Sutherland.

The routine work of the service departments of the University was efficiently done and is covered in detail in the appended reports of the Treasurer, the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds, the Manager of Purchases, and the Manager of Residential Halls.

APPENDIX II :

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

To the Comptroller:

The following is the Annual Report of the Superintendent of the Department of Buildings and Grounds for the year 1926-27.

The year as a whole was the least active one since the war in the way of extraordinary repairs, changes and new construction such as the Department is accustomed to handling.

CARE OF BUILDINGS

This Division has been improving its efficiency by getting more competent employees at a slight increase in pay, the benefits derived more than offsetting the increased cost.

During the year there have been five changes in the janitorial staff, four on account of age or physical disability or both, and one because of change of residence.

REPAIR OF BUILDINGS

In addition to the general small miscellaneous repairs several large items that required a considerable expenditure were done. The larger of these were as follows: Goldwin Smith Hall and Rockefeller Hall, extensive gutter renewals and interior decorations; Sage Chapel, the leaded windows repaired at considerable expense; Hydraulic Laboratory, south wall was taken down and rebuilt also a wood floor replaced with one of reinforced concrete.

THE GROUNDS DIVISION

This Division was occupied as usual with general maintenance of the Campus' roads, walks and lawns. The Division supplied labor for repair work in other Divisions. Four of the five tennis courts north of Home Economics were completed and fenced ready for use. The fifth was only rough graded. Under a Special Fund Estimate a road thirty feet wide to and around the New Greenhouses was graded and put in service. Excavation for repairs to steam lines and work in Fall Creek and Cascadilla Creek Gorges was done.

ELECTRIC SERVICE

This Division had a normal year with no very large amount of new construction work. The Division, however, was busy in upkeep and betterment of the electric installation including transmission lines, installations and maintenance of the Hydro-Electric Plant in the Gorge.

LANDSCAPING

On February 1st last a new Division of the Buildings and Grounds Department to take charge of landscape work was inaugurated. The new Division is to look after the landscape work of both the Campus and Fall Creek and Cascadilla Gorges under the Sackett Fund. So far the principal activities have been in Cascadilla Gorge. During the late winter and early spring considerable work was done on removing dead branches from the Campus elms. Since then the work has been largely in the Gorges except for grading and planting about Willard Straight Hall.

Planting has been done in both Gorges. Aside from the planting, work has been confined to Cascadilla Creek, building paths and removing the concrete dam located between the Dewitt Place and the Stewart Avenue bridges.

THE CENTRAL HEATING PLANT

This Division went through the year very comfortably with only the ordinary upkeep or maintenance expenses. A new and larger boiler feed water pump was authorized and installed, taking the place of a smaller one. The pump was made necessary owing to the addition of the fifth boiler. The plant is now equipped with two boiler feed pumps each capable of handling full load requirement and a smaller unit for light loads and summer work. The fuel supply was ample throughout the year, the reserve supply being larger than any previous year. Early in the heating season, when the prospect of a bituminous strike was being considered, the Lehigh Valley Coal Sales Company said there was a prospect of an increase in the price of barley coal on April 1, 1927, and suggested that Cornell University place orders for the year beginning April 1, 1927, at the old price and they would protect the institution. This was done and considerable tonnage for the coming year put in reserve. Because of this arrangement the reserve supply on June 30, 1927, was sufficient for nearly a half-year's requirements.

The demolition of the boilers and stacks in the old heating plant was arranged with Citron-Byer of Trenton, New Jersey, through H. P. Brearley of New York. The Citron-Byer concern was to remove all the material and take down the two stacks without cost to the University, the value in the material to pay for removing the two stacks. The work has gone slowly. The boilers were removed but the stacks have not been taken down although one is partly dismantled. With these boilers were also included the boilers in the temporary heating plant at the Residential Halls for men.

TRANSMISSION LINES

While there was no interruption of service there was considerable trouble and expense in connection with the return water lines due to corrosion. This trouble developed late in the year 1925-26. The most serious conditions were in three places, one between West Avenue and Baker Mess Hall, another along East Avenue opposite Rockefeller Hall and the third on Garden Avenue south of the Drill Hall. In all of these cases new pipe had to be put in. Investigation brought out the fact that the trouble was free oxygen in the water which attacked the pipe similarly to an acid, causing corrosion. Deactivation or the removing of the free oxygen corrected the trouble. Such being the case deactivators have been installed at a considerable cost on all return lines where they are full of water at all times. Although deactivation may not be a complete cure there was no trouble from corrosion during the past year.

WATER SUPPLY AND FILTRATION PLANT

This unit gave continuous service during the year, supplying a total of 138,507,000 gallons or a daily average of 383,000 gallons. The daily average for the year 1925-26 was 367,000 gallons.

The plant is working satisfactorily, but its condition is such that extensive repairs will be required in the very near future. Therefore, the construction of the new plant is urged, hoping it can be put in service before it becomes necessary to make extensive repairs on the present plant. The reservoir was cleaned and needed repairs were made and one filter was cleaned and repaired. The distributing system has been improved by replacing old and obsolete fire hydrants with new three-way hydrants, each with a steamer and two hose connections.

Plans and specifications are completed and bids requested for the new water supply. In the event the bids are satisfactory, the new plant will soon be in operation so that extensive repairs on the old plant will not be necessary.

DRILL HALL

The acoustical correction in the Drill Room improved conditions very materially.

Owing to the failure of the circulating system, which supplied hot water from the gymnasium, a new hot water heater was installed in the building to take its place. This arrangement was more economical than to repair the lines as well as being more satisfactory.

By request the tank "America" was moved from its location on the bank south of the building and placed on the concrete floor in the Drill Room.

A tablet, presented by Major Seaman, in commemoration of Cornell University's part in the World War, was placed on the south wall of the west entrance to the Drill Room.

Considerable work was done during the year in general repair and upkeep. This work will be continued the coming year.

AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE

The work of converting the old heating plant into a garage was completed and it is now used as such. It will take the place of the small garage which will be dismantled when the Plant Industry Building is erected.

The work of relocating the water, sewer drain, gas pipes, electric and telephone services to clear the site of the proposed Plant Industry Building has been completed and the utilities are working satisfactorily. The necessary steam line changes have not been made, as the arrangement with the State Architect's office was to have this done as part of the new work. With only foundation work to be done now on the Plant Industry Building, the steam changes will be made under a Special Fund Estimate request by this Department.

The new greenhouses north of the barns were put in service in June 1926. They have worked out very nicely and are quite satisfactory.

VETERINARY COLLEGE

The College installed a Pendleton control system for regulating and governing the steam heat in the buildings. The installation was not completed until late in the season so there was not time to get a definite idea of its operation. It is expected, however, to show a considerable saving in steam and at the same time maintain a more uniform temperature.

The regular maintenance was about all of the work done during the year. The Buildings and Grounds forces did considerable redecorating and small repair work.

The following tabulations and statements will show the number of employees and the cost and expenditures of the Department of Buildings and Grounds for the year 1926-27.

The average number of employees was a little below last year, being only 190 or about 6% less. Here again the decrease was largely in Grounds Labor. The difference is accounted for by the lesser amount of extraordinary repair and improvement work done.

The total expenditures of the Department, including salaries, was \$332,564.74, an increase over the previous year of \$58,228.69. Comparison with last year would show that all three items, Salaries, Maintenance and Operation, and Improvements are more. There were some salary increases and one new member for five months, which, together with a much smaller credit, will probably account for the increase. In Maintenance and Operation some large jobs were done which formerly were on Special Appropriations. The Improvement item increase is larger because of the Special Baker Laboratory redecorating and beautifying Creeks and Gorges funds carried in this account.

The total appropriations for this work were \$240,799.92, or \$5,616.52 more than the year previous. The expenditures also were more than a year ago by \$6,991.76, while the unexpended balance was \$1,374.54 less. Comparisons would show that nearly all items except Heating, which was \$5,914.94 less than a year ago, exceeded those of the previous year. This indicates that the cost of all the other items of maintenance and operation were \$12,906.70 more than in the year 1925-26. Some very large items of repairs usually cared for by Special Appropriations were done on maintenance funds, which accounts for the increased cost.

The number of janitors was 41, or $\frac{1}{2}$ a janitor less than last year. Due to several small increases in wages, the total amount of salaries paid was more than a year ago but the saving on extra labor and supplies brings the total cost down to only \$304.19 more. The increase is so small that the unit cost, \$.041 per square foot, was practically the same as the year previous.

All of the electric current used by the University was supplied from its own Power Plant in Fall Creek Gorge. The total amount used was 2,106,908 K. W. hours, an increase over the year 1925-26 of 53,447 K. W. hours or almost 2.6%. Comparison would show that the increase and decrease in the amount of current used is not confined to one class of buildings, Baker Laboratory being much less while the Heating Plants, Library and Willard Straight Hall were more, the Library and Willard Straight Hall showing from 50 to 60% increase.

The summary statement gives the capacity of the plant the same as in previous years, namely, 650 K. W., but shows that the daily load figures are more than the year before, indicating that the use of current is increasing each year. In the year just past the night loads were much heavier than formerly.

The yearly output also shows an increase every year. A maximum peak load of 745 K. W. on 650 K. W. plant indicates that the plant limit is not far off.

From the figures it appears that the University Heating Plant used 31,753 gross tons of coal during the year, an increase of 3,637 gross tons over a year ago. Although the space heated was practically the same this year as last the increase in the amount of fuel used can be accounted for very largely in two ways. The substitute fuels used last year were, in most cases, higher grade, more expensive and gave a greater evaporation than barley coal but at the same time caused a great deal of expense in boiler repairs which makes it unwise to consider them as a permanent fuel. The other reason is the inability to get absolutely accurate figures on the reserve. The net cost of fuel was \$127,240.62, a decrease of \$8,283.15 over the previous year. The average cost of coal per ton was \$4.00, or \$.82 less than in 1925-26. The difference in cost is due to the fact that in the year just closing the fuel was barley coal, while the year before it was a mixture of several classes and kinds of fuel at higher prices for a considerable portion other than barley coal. All other departments of the University used 1,705 gross tons against 2,007 gross tons in the previous year, a decrease of 302 tons. The Agricultural College used 301 tons as against 401 tons the previous year, a decrease of 100 tons.

The comparative statement of the cost of coal for eight years indicates that unit price is getting less each year and in the case of domestic fuel very nearly the minimum for the period covered by the statement.

The steam distribution for the year 1926-27 is shown on the next page.

The steam distribution statement for the year gives a total of 382,466,000 pounds of steam used. This is 11,762,000 pounds less than the previous year, which indicates a more economical use of steam. However, a mild winter and the inaccuracy in meters might account for a portion of the difference.

APPENDIX III:

REPORT OF THE MANAGER OF PURCHASES

To the Comptroller:

The activities of the Purchasing Department during the year 1926-27 show a normal increase in the number and amount of orders clearing through the central storeroom in Morse Hall. The stock turnover, or percentage of annual inventory to total issues, was 3.6%, or practically the same as the previous year.

A new department has been established in connection with the storeroom for the purchase of books. This work was started in October and during the nine months there have been purchased 1497 books for the various departments of the university.

Considerable expansion has taken place in the service shop for multigraphing, mimeographing, etc., and the equipment has been increased to take care of the additional demand. A multigraph typesetter and an additional multigraph printer have been added during the year.

The total issues from the central storeroom during the year amounted to \$85,124.77 as against \$68,811.53 the previous year and \$29,232.52 the year before. The percentage of stores orders to total orders issued was 33.6 as against 28.2 the previous year, and 20.3 the year before. Approximately 1400 items are carried regularly in stock at the present time.

Our close affiliation with the Educational Buyers Association during the past year has been of great benefit to the university. Through Association price agreements and contracts very satisfactory savings have been made in the purchase of many commodities and comparisons made as to routine practice and standardization have resulted in valuable suggestions.

In Willard Straight Hall private dining rooms, Tea Room, Terrace Room and Cafeteria, a total of 548,252 meals were served; in the Soda Bar 48,910 patrons were served.

In August 1926 the members of the International Congress of Plant Sciences, attending the meetings in Ithaca, were housed in the University Halls of Residence; meals for these guests were served in Willard Straight Hall.

In April 1927, the Athletic Conference of American College Women was entertained in Risley Hall.

In June 1927, the Junior Project guests were housed in the University dormitories. Meals for these children were served in Willard Straight and Cascadilla cafeterias.

The last week of June 1927, the delegates to the National Conference of the Alpha Epsilon Phi Sorority were cared for in Risley Hall.

During Alumni Days all the facilities of the dormitories and dining rooms were taxed to capacity. May I again mention the fine spirit of co-operation shown by both the regular staff and student employees at this time.

During the college year 208 students were regularly employed in the dining rooms and cafeterias of the dormitories and Willard Straight Hall, receiving in return their board or a fixed wage per hour.

In the Baker Group and Founders Hall the radiators and steam fittings were thoroughly overhauled, new valves being supplied where necessary. The locks throughout the rooms in these buildings were repaired and renewed where necessary.

In Cascadilla Hall the work of remodeling the bath rooms was completed with the exception of those in the basement. To a great extent this remodeling necessitated new piping through the building.

In Sage College the usual number of student rooms were redecorated; the bath rooms were redecorated throughout. The post office boxes for the students were rebuilt. The masonry work outside of the building has been thoroughly repaired. In many places the ivy on the building had grown between the bricks, making openings where water had worked between the bricks and frozen.

In the basement of Sage College the old boiler used to provide steam for the kitchens and laundry has been taken out and the rooms remodeled to accommodate the new laundry machinery required to handle the additional work from Willard Straight Hall and the dormitories.

In Risley Hall two corridors of student rooms were redecorated. The hot water lines at both the east and west ends of the building have been renewed.

At 5 East Avenue the student rooms on the first floor have been redecorated and new lavatories installed.
