REPORT OF THE COMPTROLLER

To the Board of Trustees of Cornell University:

I have the honor to submit herewith the financial statement of Cornell University covering the fiscal year from July 1, 1930, to June 30, 1931, inclusive.

The net cost of conducting the endowed colleges at Ithaca during the year exceeded the income available for that purpose by \$135,807.18. This amount added to the existing debit balance at the beginning of the year increases the accumulated deficit in current income to \$196,906.85. Appropriations not yet expended, but necessarily continued to cover contracts made or under consideration, amount to \$83,319.97, making the total debit balance \$280,226.82 in the current maintenance account. In Schedule VI, page 58 of this report, are shown items for the purchase of property for the future needs of the University or for expenditures made in anticipation of building operations to the amount of \$1,124,724.31. These items have been financed temporarily from current credits and by borrowing from the endowment funds and must eventually be met by gifts or appropriations from funds now treated as endowment, or from current income.

The income of the Medical College in New York exceeded the disbursements for the year by \$48,112.51, thereby increasing the credit balance in current income to \$244,226.24. Of this amount \$150,000 has been appropriated to cover certain temporary or emergency services to be engaged in by the college during 1931-32 in preparation for the transfer to the new site and organization, and \$24,807.02 is necessarily reappropriated to meet authorized obligations. There remains a credit balance of current income of \$69,419.22.

The expenses of the State colleges at the University in excess of gifts for current expenses and certain income available from University and Federal funds were fully met from the appropriations made by the State of New York.

A summary of the receipts and expenditures is shown in Exhibit A, and the condensed income and expense statements appear in Exhibits B and C.

On June 15, 1931, the group insurance plan as applicable to the teaching and administrative staffs of the University became effective. It now covers, 1,227 persons with insurance aggregating \$4,780,000. These figures will undoubtedly be increased when the staffs reach their maximum number with the opening of the University in the Fall. The group insurance provision has been eagerly accepted by a large proportion of those eligible to its benefits and the cost will make the balancing of budgets in the future even more difficult than at present.

THE UNIVERSITY ENDOWMENT

The permanent endowment or income producing funds of the University aggregate \$24,919,028.02, an increase of \$898,152.15 during the year. Of these funds \$17,202,485.15 are for the benefit of the University at Ithaca and \$7,716,542.87 for the Medical College in New York City. A list of these funds with the purposes for which the income from each is to be used and showing the increases made during the year will be found in Exhibit D, page 11.

The average rate of return received upon investments during the year and credited to the several funds was 5.268 per cent, as compared with 5.523 per cent in the preceding year, and an average of 5.431 per cent for the preceding ten years. The decrease in the average rate of return from 5.523 per cent to 5.268 per cent is accounted for partly by defaults in our Seaboard Airline bonds, by the lower interest rates on securities purchased during the year, by decreases in dividends on some of our railroad and other stocks, and by the larger amount of uninvested cash held throughout the year—following a deliberate policy of the Finance Committee during this unsettled period.

The market values of our securities have, in line with the values of securities throughout the world, dropped below our book values by some \$2,294,000. Approximately \$981,000 of this decrease in values is in the securities, largely oil and tobacco stocks, received from the Payne Whitney estate. Deducting this shrinkage from the total of \$2,294,000 leaves a net shrinkage in our consolidated endowment securities of approximately \$1,313,000. These figures may be compared with those of July 1, 1921, when the book values of the University's securities exceeded the market values by approximately \$3,500,000.

As this is being written it looks as if the financial and industrial crisis through which the world is passing would bring about a further decrease in our average rate of return for the present fiscal year.

The above table shows the diversification of the University's investments.

SEMI-CENTENNIAL ENDOWMENT FUND

The subscriptions (exclusive of gifts for special purposes, such as buildings, which, under the resolution of the Board of Trustees, form part of the Semi-Centennial Endowment Fund) secured by the Semi-Centennial Endowment Committee aggregate \$6,660,595.29.

Of these uncollected subscriptions \$697,762.56 are from the Classes of 1920-23 inclusive, payable through the Cornellian Council and not yet due; \$1,192,414.96 are payable at the convenience of the donor; and \$43,366.05 are payable at definite dates which have not yet been reached. This leaves a balance of only \$208,509.56 of subscriptions which, by their terms, have matured but have not yet been paid. During the year, in addition to \$2,314.29 paid through the Cornellian Council, there was paid into the University on account of the principal of subscriptions \$40,087.96. Of this amount, \$29,151.88 was paid on account of principal maturing prior to the beginning of the year; \$3,003.70 on principal maturing during the year; and \$7,932.29 on account of subscriptions not yet matured or payable at convenience. Interest amounting to \$33,893.14 was collected. Twenty-six extensions of time of payment were granted and thirty subscriptions were paid in full. Further details of these subscriptions are shown in Exhibit E, page 45.

GIFTS

Donations to the University passing through the books of this office during the year aggregated \$1,333,032.26. Undoubtedly some gifts were made directly to departments and were not reported to us. In addition to the payment of \$73,981.10 on account of subscriptions to the Semi-Centennial Endowment Fund above mentioned, donations were received from alumni through the Cornellian Council aggregating \$726,983.88. These gifts are listed in detail in Exhibit F, page 47. Other gifts amounting to \$532,067.28 are shown on page 49, Exhibit G.

THE PHYSICAL PLANT

The War Memorial group of residential halls for men, including the Towers with the connecting Cloister, and McFaddin and Lyon Halls, was completed early in the year, as was also Boldt Tower. The Plant Science building erected by the State for the College of Agriculture was finished and occupied during the academic year. The construction of Myron Taylor Hall to house the Law School has progressed steadily and it is expected that the building will be completed during the coming year. The contract for the laboratory building at the New York State Experiment Station at Geneva has been let and work begun. Plans and specifications for the new building for the College of Home Economics and the building for the department of Agricultural Economics in the College of Agriculture are nearing completion and contracts will probably be let in the Fall.

Mr. Charles E. Curtis, '85, who has served the University as Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds since October 1, 1915, retired on June 30, 1931, pursuant to the provisions of the University Statutes. During his superintendency, building projects totaling more than \$12,000,000 have been erected on the Campus. These include the Baker Dormitories, the Drill Hall, the Baker Chemical Laboratory, Boldt Hall, Willard Straight Hall, Balch Halls, the War Memorial, the Plant Science building, the Dairy building, and the Central Heating Plant, as well as the new Water Plant and Reservoir. He gave to these projects the benefit of a wide engineering and construction experience, and at the same time handled the routine care and maintenance of buildings and grounds in a quiet and efficient manner.

Mr. Conant Van Blarcom, a graduate of the University with the Class of 1908, succeeds Mr. Curtis as Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds.

The routine work of the service departments of the University is, I believe, satisfactorily performed. There are appended detailed reports of the Treasurer, the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds, the Manager of Purchases, and the Manager of Residential Halls.

SUMMARY OF RECEIPTS AND EXPENDITURES

For accounting purposes the University is separated into six divisions: A, the endowed colleges in Ithaca; B, the Medical College in New York; C, the Veterinary College; D, the College of Agriculture; E, the College of Home Economics; F, the Agricultural Experiment Station at Geneva, N. Y.

In subdivision A, which for accounting purposes may be termed the University, are included many general items of income and expense which inure to the benefit, in a varying degree, of the five other divisions, or to the use and benefit of the students registered in the colleges constituting these divisions. Some such items are the expense of the general administrative offices, the library, the infirmary, the residential halls, the upkeep of the campus and playgrounds, and the departments of music, hygiene, military and physical training.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

To the Comptroller:

The following is the Annual Report of the Superintendent of the Department of Buildings and Grounds for the year 1930-31:

In addition to the regular maintenance work a considerable amount of improvement of physical plant and new construction was carried on which kept the Department busy.

CARE OF BUILDINGS

The condition of the buildings improves each year. This statement is substantiated by the report of the Manufacturers Mutual Fire Insurance Company which says that the housekeeping is good. The number of employees, wages paid and supplies used is approximately as of a year ago. The cost therefore, is practically the same. It compares very favorably with the cost of similar work in other universities. There were two changes in personnel, one because of physical disability and one discharged for cause, as he refused to have a physical examination.

REPAIRS TO BUILDINGS

The maintenance work was carried on as usual. The condition of the buildings is improved over a year ago. The principal items of improvement to Physical Plant and new construction with which this section had some considerable part are the following: Additions to the central heating plant, alterations in the University Library, special sound-proofing floor for the School of Music, revamping the house at 15 South Avenue, alterations for the Department of Psychology, alterations in the Architectural Library, White Hall, and improvement in the Drill Hall.

GROUNDS DEPARTMENT

The Grounds division of the Department was quite active throughout the year. The maintenance work held on during the winter as there was an unusual amount of walk and road work. This section had much to do with the improvement of the Physical Plant and new construction as follows: Rebuilt the Rifle Range revetment in concrete, automatic sprinkler system for Rockefeller Hall, Faculty Apartment garages, quarry operation, completing central heating plant extension, roads, walks, grading and seeding at War Memorial and Boldt Tower and the extension west of the culvert under Judd Falls Road.

ELECTRIC SERVICE DEPARTMENT

This Division was usually busy on maintenance and had a considerable amount of work in connection with the central heating plant extension, changes in the Agricultural College service lines to take care of new construction, and street lights on Tower Road and on Central Avenue from South Avenue to President's Avenue. Also its part of the work in connection with all other improvements where electricity was required.

The synchronous operation with the Associated Gas & Electric System went through the year without any operating difficulties. However, the exceedingly dry year made it necessary for the University to take a large amount of current from the Associated Gas & Electric System, at times exceeding 50 per cent of the total University requirement. A statement of the account will be found later on in this report.

QUARRY

Work in the quarry continued throughout the summer and fall, getting out stone for Myron Taylor Hall. When work stopped on December 16 it was estimated that there were approximately 5,000 perch of stone quarried or about 70 per cent of the 6,600 or 7,000 perch required for the building. On March 17, 1931, work was again resumed and operations were in full force at the end of the year. The work was carried on quite satisfactorily.

LANDSCAPING

The major part of the work was in Fall Creek and about Beebe Lake. The Sackett Memorial walk north of Sibley and the stone arch bridge at the upper end of Beebe Lake were both finished. The wall along Forest Home Drive at the east end of Beebe Lake was started in the Fall but was not finished at the end of the year. The campus work was very largely that of taking care of the trees and shrubs already planted. Some vistas were cut and some improvement was made along Judd Falls Road directly west of the greenhouse range. There is some evidence of the campus elms dying. Is it not possible that owing to the extremely dry season during the summer and fall of 1930, the trees could not get the necessary moisture for their proper growth? Such being the condition, a thorough saturation of the soil to a depth of four or six feet by a liberal use of the fire hose might be very beneficial in prolonging the life of the trees.

CENTRAL HEATING PLANT

The plant maintained its previous record of satisfactory operations during the year. There were no excessive or unusual repairs. The enlargement of the plant, started last year, was completed and the two new boilers Nos. 6 and 7 tested and put in operation during the winter. On test the boilers developed 300 per cent of rating. They can be operated at 275 per cent continuously without detriment to them—a very satisfactory showing. Both building and equipment were erected by university labor.

WATER SUPPLY

The plant operated without any interruption of service during the entire year. The consumption for the year was as follows: University, 132,290,625 gallons; Agricultural College, 81,560,375 gallons; total 213,851,000 gallons. The average daily demand was: University, 362,440 gallons; Agricultural College, 223,453 gallons; total 585,893 gallons.

WAR MEMORIAL AND BOLDT TOWER

These buildings were put in service with the opening of the University in the fall of 1930. While the grading, walks, etc., originally planned, were completed last year, additional grading and seeding was done west of War Memorial and east of West Avenue; also west of Boldt Tower. The War Memorial was dedicated on May 23, 1931.

MYRON TAYLOR HALL

Work was started July 1, 1930, and good progress was made until December 30, 1930, when weather conditions made the contractor practically stop operations. Work was resumed March 15, 1931, and good progress has been made since then. The expectation is that the building will be finished this fall.

JUDD FALLS ROAD

According to verbal statements of the county highway officials it is planned to improve Judd Falls Road in the summer of 1932. There have been two hearings held in Ithaca by the Public Service Commission on the elimination

of the grade crossing with the E. C. & N. Railroad at East Ithaca—the first one on February 18, 1931, and the second on May 8, 1931. As yet no report of the findings of the Public Service Commission has been received.

AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE

The construction activity of 1929-30 continued throughout the past year. The larger items were the calf barn, an addition to the threshing shed, buildings for the egg-laying contests in Stafford and Elmira, and sheep and swine barns. All the work was completed except the sheep and swine barns, which were not started until nearly the end of the year. Contracts were let for the foundation of the Agricultural Economics building on April 11, 1931. This work was well under way at the close of the year. The Plant Science Building was occupied during the winter for the first time. The contract for the roads, walks and grading about the building has been let to the P. D. Conley Construction Company. Work was started June 28, 1931. The improvement of Garden Avenue from Tower Road to Bailey Hall was also let to the P. D. Conley Construction Company with the Plant Science Building work and started at the same time. The amount of the two contracts was \$32,592. Of this total amount \$15,000 is for the Plant Science Building work and \$17,592 is for the Garden Avenue improvement.

The total departmental expenditures including superintendents' salaries was \$355,333.55, or \$71,350.22 less than in the previous year. The excessive expenditure a year ago was due mostly to Beebe Lake dredging, Tower Avenue paving and Campus Development accounts, the cost on the three items totaling \$70,688.15. Deducting this expenditure from the previous year's total would leave \$24,352.80 expended for improvements. This would mean that the total expenditure of this year would be only \$662.07 under that of a year ago.

The total appropriation for the year was \$375,053.47, an increase of \$5,420.82 over last year, of which fuel received \$5,000, leaving only \$420.82 for the other divisions. Deducting the balance on the fuel appropriation of \$52,361.22 and on the Steam Transmission Line appropriation of \$3004.44, which did not require such extensive repairs as in previous years, the unexpended balance would be \$17,154.59, or about 4.5 per cent of the total appropriation.

Applying the 10 to 1 ratio in accordance with the contract the difference is in favor of the Gas & Electric Company, namely, 585,000 less one-tenth of 1,482,600, or 436,740 KWH, which, at the contract price of \$.03 per KWH, would amount to \$13,102.20.

The total amount of coal burned for all purposes was 31,174 tons, 1,671 tons less than a year ago. The heating plant burned 29,483 tons as compared with 31,268 a year ago or a decrease of about 5.7 per cent. The total cost of fuel burned for the year was \$127,329.25, a decrease of \$2,531.80 under the previous year. The coal on hand at the end of the present year was 8,616 tons.

STEAM DISTRIBUTION

The distribution of steam from the Central Heating plant in 1930-31 is shown by a table on page 157. The total sent out was 389,530,000 pounds, a decrease of 27,049,000 over a year ago, or about 6 per cent. This corresponds very favorably with the decrease in coal consumption, which was 5.7 per cent and shows an improvement in operating efficiency.

The total appropriation for improvements and betterment of plant, \$33,925.95, was \$104,131.37 less than last year. With the exception of four items, the main one being the Military Department, having a balance of \$2,263.90, the money was all expended.

REPORT OF THE MANAGER OF PURCHASES

To the Comptroller:

I submit the following report for the year ended June 30, 1931.

This year of Purchasing Department activities has been marked chiefly by the consolidation of the two separate Purchasing Offices into a central office in Morrill Hall and the assumption of additional duties in connection with the Veterinary College and the Agricultural Experiment Station at Geneva. As was predicted in last year's report, the central purchasing office has resulted in much greater efficiency and opportunity for service.

All of the orders for the Veterinary College are now being made out in the Purchasing Department and the vouchers are being approved for payment in conformance with the procedure for the other colleges. The requisitions issued by the Agricultural Experiment Station at Geneva are passing through this department for approval before the orders are issued, resulting in such benefits as the experience of the Purchasing Department can contribute.

The total amount of the purchase orders issued during the fiscal year was \$1,154,756.03, which represents a slight increase over the previous year. This expenditure involved the handling of 25,638 requisitions and the issuing of 18,120 orders. The average expenditure per order has again increased and the figure is \$63.73 as compared to \$61.93 last year and \$49.43 the year before. This index figure has increased steadily year by year, but has probably reached a figure which is not likely to be bettered until a consolidation of stores and service departments makes possible an additional opportunity for combining requirements.

The operation of College Stores has continued its increase, the total amount of issues from Stores totaling \$138,333.76 during the fiscal year. The inventory of stock on July 1 amounted to a little over \$16,000 which represents a turnover in the stock room of over eight times. This figure is the largest in the history of the Purchasing Department and is accounted for partly by the fact that commodity prices during the year have been continually declining. This caused a policy in buying in smaller quantities for stock in order to take advantage of the falling prices and has resulted in a reduced inventory at all times. In a rising market our purchases for stock should be anticipated and larger amounts be bought which, while effecting an economy, would reduce the turnover.

The University Print Shop has had an increase of business of approximately 25 per cent, the total receipts for the year being \$13,224.08. One new automatic press has been purchased and all equipment is in excellent condition. The margin of receipts over expenditures amounted to \$2,785. which is more than ample for depreciation. It is unfortunate that additional space is not available, as this shop is too crowded for the most efficient operation. In two years the work has more than doubled with no increase in working space.

The University Messenger Service and Stores Delivery have been maintained throughout the year without additional equipment expense in spite of a large increase in both of these services.

During the year a large proportion of the equipment for the new Plant Science building has been purchased and installed, the building being occupied in February. In addition, considerable preliminary work has been done in connection with the equipment investigation and estimating for the new Agricultural Economics building, the Home Economics building, the new Law School, and the Horticultural building at Geneva.

The Purchasing Department has been active in association work, taking an active part in the work of the Committee of the National Association of Purchasing Agents appointed to work out standards for metal office furniture. The recommendation of this committee has been accepted and approved by the

Division of Simplified Practice, United States Department of Commerce. A close contact has been maintained with the Educational Buyers' Association, the membership of which has steadily increased, and very substantial savings have been effected for the University through the price agreements and contracts made by the Association. Much of the work of this Association which has benefited this department has been brought about through the opportunity of assisting in the direction of its policies and activities.

In the office of the Purchasing Department the routine work has been standardized to a greater extent than previously, owing largely to the consolidation of our two offices, and the catalog and information files are more complete and useful. The experience of each member of the Purchasing Staff is now available in connection with every purchase and much duplication of work has been eliminated.

In Willard Straight Hall private dining rooms, Tea Room, Terrace Room, Cafeteria and Training Table, a total of 568,248 meals were served; in the Soda Bar 101,009 patrons were served.

The house at 15 South Avenue was remodeled to accommodate students; thirty graduate men lived there.

The War Memorial Towers, Lyon and McFaddin Halls, were opened for students in September 1930; Boldt Tower was used to accommodate Summer School students in July and August 1930.

From August 18-29, 1930, the International Conference of Agricultural Economists was housed in Prudence Risley Hall. Meals were served for this group in Willard Straight Hall.

The National Convention of the Alpha Chi Rho fraternity was housed in Boldt Hall and North and South Baker Halls, from September 10 to 13. They obtained their meals at Willard Straight Hall.

The Residential Halls Dining Department served a buffet supper at the Drill Hall the evening of June 2, 1931, for the Holstein-Friesian Association, while they were the guests of the Agricultural College.

The annual Junior Project of the Farm and Home Bureau was held from June 29 through July 3, 1931. The young women attending were housed in Cascadilla Hall. The boys were housed outside of the dormitories. Meals were served for this group in the Willard Straight Cafeteria.

With the shortening of the University noon hour the patronage at the Cascadilla Cafeteria dropped considerably. The cafeteria was closed June 15, 1931. Part of the space occupied by the cafeteria and dining room is being remodeled as suites of rooms for students.

During the college year 194 students were regularly employed in the dining rooms of the dormitories and Willard Straight Hall, receiving in return their board or a fixed wage per hour.

The private branch telephone exchange for the dormitories has proved very satisfactory although expensive to operate. It has been a great convenience to the students especially in the placing of long distance calls; it has helped to cut down the noise in the dormitory corridors and it has facilitated the operating of the dormitories.

The convenience of adequate storage space at East Ithaca for the food supplies for the dormitories has facilitated their work.

During the rush periods of Alumni Week and Conventions, the dining rooms and dormitories were greatly aided by the rapidity with which the new laundry could handle their linen.

In Prudence Risley Hall the redecorating of the study-bedrooms has been completed. A false ceiling has been placed in the sixth floor rooms and corridors. This ceiling has facilitated the heating of the tower. A new roof was placed over the kitchen and garage. All the woodwork on the outside of the building has been painted during the year. The chimneys have been repaired or rebuilt where necessary.

In Sage College the work of redecorating the study-bedrooms was continued. The outside walls of the building have been repaired; the chimneys where no longer in use capped, and the chimneys in use rebuilt. A new transformer room was built at the entrance to the east wing and new wiring brought into the building.

At 308 Wait Avenue the entire inside of the house has been redecorated.

At 15 East Avenue the inside of the house has been redecorated.

In Cascadilla Hall the redecorating of the study-bedrooms has been completed.

In South Baker Hall new floors were laid in ten rooms. This work should be continued throughout the Baker Group.

In Balch Halls the doors of the dining rooms and drawing rooms have been painted. The doors on all floors leading to the incinerator have been tightened and repaired.
