## REPORT OF THE TREASURER

To the Board of Trustees of Cornell University:

A brief summary of the year's operations, which are detailed in this report, follow:

The Endowed Colleges at Ithaca had a small operating surplus of \$769.68, after setting aside \$9,000 for allocation by the President to

special projects.

The Medical College (a separate accounting unit) again was run, as had been anticipated, at a small deficit, \$7,095.38. This was charged against the surplus of previous years' operations, reducing said surplus to \$29,160.26.

The Colleges of Agriculture, Veterinary Medicine, Home Economics and the Experiment Station at Geneva each had small operat-

ing credit balances.

The Balance Sheet, for the first time, has been made to reflect the cost of the entire educational plant of the University, by the inclusion therein of the properties and equipment of the State Colleges and Experiment Station. These items have been listed, properly segregated, under Plant Assets. It was felt that their inclusion in the University's Balance Sheet will more accurately reflect our educa-

tional plant in comparison with our sister institutions.

The operations of the University's consolidated investment account resulted in earnings at the rate of 4.077% on the book value of endowments. This is a slight improvement over the 4.0073% earned for the previous year. Present disturbed world conditions preclude the making of even a wild guess at what we may expect during the current year. As for market values of endowment investments, the depreciation on June 30th was about 19% or \$5,829,596.24 on a total of \$31,015,017.11 book values of endowments. If available reserves are deducted, the depreciation percentage is slightly below 16.

The budgetary rate of 4.25% that was guaranteed by the Finance Committee necessitated a charge of \$46,514.16 against our Income Stabilization account. As a partial offset, an unused special income reserve of \$29,106.67 was credited to this account, effecting a net reduction in this account from \$313,279.55 to \$295,872.06. For the fiscal year 1940-41, the guarantee of the Finance Committee is 4.10%

for budgetary purposes.

Gifts and donations for the year totaled \$1,104,942.66. These are listed in detail on page 163. Of these, \$627,102.68 were added to en-

dowments, or are being carried as capital sums.

In addition to the detailed report of the Treasurer, there are appended the reports of the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds,

Manager of Purchases, Manager of Residential Halls, Comstock Publishing Company, Inc., and the Cornell Research Foundation, Inc. These reports are compiled with care and at considerable time and expense, and to any one interested in the detail of the operation of a large university, tell a most interesting story.

#### ACCOUNTANTS' CERTIFICATE

Board of Trustees of Cornell University:

We have examined the balance sheet of Cornell University as of June 30, 1940, the related statements of income and expenditures for the year ended June 30, 1940, and the supplemental schedules pertaining to such financial statements, have reviewed the system of internal control and the accounting procedures of the University, and have examined or tested its accounting records and other supporting evidence by methods and to the extent we deemed appropriate.

The book value of investments generally represents cost, or market value at date of acquisition in the case of investments acquired by gift. No specific provision has been made for amortization of bond premiums, although two per cent of the net income on investments has been credited to the investment reserve fund for investment losses. Provision has been made for depreciation of only

certain of the real estate investments.

The plant assets of the State Colleges as shown on the accompanying balance sheet are in the custody and control of the University, but ownership thereof is vested in the State of New York.

In our opinion, subject to the explanations in the two preceding paragraphs, the accompanying balance sheet and related statements of income and expenditures and supplemental schedules fairly present the financial condition of the University at June 30, 1940 and the results of its operations for the year ended that date, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles consistently followed by the University. The Income and Expense of the Athletic Association are not included in sum-

maries of University Income and Expense. Details will be found in Schedule 49.

In Subdivision A, which for accounting purposes may be termed the University, are included many general items of income and expense which inure to the benefit in a varying degree of the five other divisions, or to the use and benefit of the students registered in the colleges constituting these divisions. Some such items are the expense of the general administrative offices, the library, the infirmary, the residential halls, the upkeep of the campus and playgrounds, and the departments of music, hygiene, military, and physical training.





## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

To the Treasurer:

Following is the annual report of the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds for the year 1939-40:

GENERAL

During the past year, as in previous years, the effort of the Department of Buildings and Grounds, while carrying on the routine work, has been to improve conditions on the Campus and in the buildings.

#### CARE OF BUILDINGS

The more intensive use of academic buildings during the year 1939-40 has been reflected in the increased housekeeping costs. The custodians have been hard pressed to maintain the standards of cleaning demanded. Efforts to increase their value to other divisions of the department, by early reporting of utility failures, of necessary building repairs, etc., have been partially successful.

One of the means used to promote the necessary custodial spirit among the employees and improve their efficiency is the "Cornell Custodian," a small pamphlet

published periodically by this division.

Experimental operations of night cleaning systems and continued studies of janitorial methods hold some hope of meeting further increases in loads and

responsibilities without proportionately increased costs.

A Fire Prevention Service organized and operated by this division has been concerned primarily with frequent inspections of the University buildings tending to the control of fire hazards. A program was developed in cooperation with the University's fire insurers which is in harmony with the insurers' inspection service. Salvage Department operations have also contributed materially to the reduction of the risk of loss by fire through its efforts in cleaning storage areas.

In September of 1939, the Care of Buildings division took over from the Purchasing Department the operation and personnel of the Salvage Department which had been created early that year. This department, as a unit of the Care of Buildings division, has placed in service, or liquidated, a quantity of unused or obsolete equipment and supplies found in University buildings. With policies still incompletely formulated and operations on an experimental basis, the future of this department is yet undetermined. However, results to date are encouraging.

#### CAMPUS PATROL

Through the past year this department has tried to obtain the optimum use of the campus streets and parking areas by better control of the issuance of campus parking permits and student car registrations. (Over 1500 faculty members and campus employees have "Faculty-Administration" parking permits. Over 1300 students registered cars with this office during each term of the past year and 800 during the summer session. Over 400 of these students were granted restricted campus parking permits each term and during the summer session).

The four campus patrolmen supervise traffic and parking and patrol the Campus for vandalism, etc. At least one of them is on duty until 3:00 a. m. every night except Sunday and Monday.

The seven night patrolmen continued on the same schedules and routes used previously. A little further study of their work has shown that these men walk approximately 10 miles each night in covering all of each floor of every building from the basement to the attic. The personnel of this group is now nearly up to our desired standard.

During the past year and under the supervision of this department, new locks on a centrally controlled master key system have been installed completely in the Psychology and Geology Departments and Lincoln Hall; Boardman Hall and the Library were finished and Franklin Hall started.

#### REPAIRS TO BUILDINGS

The major portion of the repair work done during the past year outside of general upkeep has been of an exterior nature, masonry pointing, roof and gutter repairs and painting with the idea of putting the exterior of our buildings in reasonable condition before any great amount of interior work was done. This has involved mainly White Hall, Morrill Hall, Rockefeller Hall, McGraw Hall and Myron Taylor Hall. Some interior painting, however, was done in Sibley College, University Library and other buildings.

# NEW CONSTRUCTION—IMPROVEMENTS

In August 1939 permission was granted by the Trustees to proceed with the construction of a new Food Storage Building adjacent to the laundry at East Ithaca and \$120,000.00 was made available for the purpose. Plans and specifications were prepared by this department.

The building is of fireproof construction, brick and tile with concrete floors and fireproofed steel frame roof, its purpose being to house the bakery for Residential Halls and provide storage for fruits, vegetables and meats.

The contract for the masonry was awarded to the H. P. Cummings Construction Company of Ware, Massachusetts, in the amount of \$52,777.00 and work was started in September 1939. Final payment was made on this contract on May 8, 1040.

The building has since been equipped with refrigeration and bakery equipment as well as many other items of lesser importance. This department installed the plumbing, heating and electric work.

During the month of February 1940 the Athletic Division requested this department to replace the crew shelter at Esty's Point on Cayuga Lake, which was burned several years ago, at an estimated cost of \$2950.00, the building to be of wood frame construction with corrugated galvanized iron sheathing.

The materials were transported to the site by train while the mechanics and laborers motored to McKinney's Point and walked the railroad track to the job. The work was done during very severe winter weather, the snow being a decided handicap, but it was completed on April 10, 1940 at a cost of \$2,063,14.

Many improvements have also been made. Boulevard lights were installed on Campus Road and near White and Lincoln Halls, the old flagstone walks in front of the Library and Stimson Hall were replaced with colprovia bordered with flagstone, and many of the old stairs in various buildings which were badly worn were covered with steel nosings and linoleum treads or steel plate, a treatment which will allow for continued use for many years to come.

In addition, the usual allowance for the academic departments made possible many changes and betterments in practically all academic buildings.

#### ELECTRIC SERVICE

The usual amount of work has been done again this year in maintaining the electric equipment and lighting over the Endowed Campus. In addition, however, considerable extra work has been made necessary by changes requested by the academic department heads.

#### UPPER CAMPUS

In addition to the general maintenance work, many major repairs were made, especially on the exteriors of the buildings. Considerable pointing of masonry was done as well as roof and gutter repairs. Contrary to the procedure on the lower Campus, changes to facilitate instruction must be made from funds made available to this department. Many of these jobs were done, such as the con-

struction of vaults for inflammable liquids in the Dairy Building and Comstock Hall, a stockroom made available in the basement of Comstock Hall, and a storage

room constructed in the storage barn at Caldwell Field.

At the Home Economics Building, a toy garage was constructed for the storage of nursery school play equipment, a quarry tile deck was placed outside Apartment A, repairs were made to roof and conductors, and a portion of the outside

trim and iron grilles was painted.

The new Horse Barn, constructed to replace the one burned in February 1938, was completed in February 1940 at a cost, inclusive of the steam line on which W.P.A. labor was used, of \$36,811.18. On March 12, a supplemental special fund estimate for the provision of work rooms on the second floor of the north wing, for the Animal Nutrition Department, was approved in the amount of \$8,172.31, the major portion of the balance remaining on the original appropriation of \$45,000.00. This work was reported as complete on May 18, 1940, the final cost being \$5,620.04. The second supplemental special fund estimate #16731 for the completion of the work in the amount of \$2,517.35 was approved and the order issued on June 10, 1940. The work was done and the final cost was \$2,419.79, making a total expenditure for the Horse Barn and workshop of \$44,851.01.

The roads, walks, paths, lawns, trees and shrubs have all received their usual care, and the trees and shrubbery, due to the unusual rains during the spring months, bear exceptional foliage and add much to the beauty of the Campus as

a whole.

#### VETERINARY COLLEGE

Work on grading, curbing and paving, a W.P.A. project, is continuing from last year and will be completed this fall.

#### ATHLETIC DIVISION

A great amount of work has been done during the past year by the Department

of Buildings and Grounds for the Athletic Division.

During the late spring of 1939, authorization was given to proceed with the construction of a nine hole golf course under the direction of Thompson and Jones, Golf Course Architects of New York, on the east side of Kline Road just north of the Poultry Experimental farm, and \$25,000.00 was made available. Work was started on May 13, 1939 and continued until December 14, 1939 when it was necessary to discontinue because of weather conditions. The expense involved for the period was \$21,338.12. On April 4, 1940 work was resumed on funds made available by the Athletic Department in the amount of \$4,795.00 which were for the purpose of cleaning up the area and making preparations for its use during the summer. The construction work, however, was not completed entirely during the year 1939-40, and practically all equipment for the maintenance will have to be purchased during the coming year.

A service road was constructed to the girls' playground and tennis courts in the rear of Balch Hall. The work on repair of the concrete on the Stadium was started with an appropriation of \$5,000.00. It is expected an equal amount will be made available each year until the repairs have been completed. Improvement was started on the playing surface of Lower Alumni Field. Considerable work was done on the rehabilitation of Hoy Field diamond and Bacon Cage. Brick entrance gate posts and a permanent brick ticket booth were constructed at the entrance to the Schoellkopf parking area. Grading and landscaping of the north side and northeast corner of Hoy Field were completed, including a stone wall back of the

baseball bleachers to retain the fill.

#### GROUNDS

This department has been most active with investigation and improvement of underground sewer and drain lines; many corrections have been made which will

contribute much to the reliability of this service.

East Avenue, south of Tower Road, has been improved with new drains, concrete curb, and an excellent pavement. Colprovia walks have been installed replacing the old cinder paths which our Alumni so fondly remember. The old concrete paving at the east entrance to Morrill Hall has been removed and replaced by more appropriate approaches flanked by turf and evergreen planting. Grading and seeding of Library slope between Central and West Avenues and between West Avenue and the Psi Upsilon and Sigma Phi fraternity houses have added much to the appearance of this section of the Campus. The Plane trees planted along West Avenue should make this an interesting street in future years.

The improvements made to the tennis courts have brought tennis very much to the front as a popular sport at Cornell. Forty-five clay courts and four colprovia courts are now in use and are frequently inadequate to serve the demands.

courts are now in use and are frequently inadequate to serve the demands.

The removal of the paving of President's Avenue and its replacement with turf was the passing of an old landmark. This avenue had been closed to vehicular use for several years and its removal has added much to the esthetic appearance of this section of the Campus. The winter of 1939-40 produced more snowfall than any in the memory of the department. The heaviest snow being coincident with Farm and Home week with its thousands of additional parked cars presented a problem which called for heroic effort on the part of many employees. Adequate additional equipment has been procured which will enable us to render improved service in the future. Weather conditions, though erratic, have been such as to present the Campus in a generally improved appearance to our many visitors.

#### LANDSCAPING

Many trees have been planted on the Campus during the year. Twelve large elms were moved from outlying University property and used as replacements on the quadrangle and nearby Campus. Six carloads of trees and evergreen shrubs were purchased and planted at the Veterinary College, Sage College, Barnes Hall, White, McGraw and Morrill Halls. Red oaks were used on either side of Tower Road. Maples were planted in front of the Veterinary buildings on Garden Avenue. Many fine specimen trees and shrubs produced in the University Nursery were planted on the Campus. Since 1936 a total of more than six hundred trees has been planted which has already added much to appearances but which will be most appreciated by the next generation of Cornellians.

#### SACKETT GORGE

Many improvements have been made in the Gorges, the most spectacular being the construction of stone stairs from Cascadilla creek level to Campus Road near Grove Place, a new stone stair from Cascadilla to Stewart Avenue street level, and the removal of a cliff which had become dangerous on the south side of Cascadilla creek near the White Gate entrance. Trails have been maintained with care, dead trees removed, etc., until this gorge has become a most popular walk for sight seekers, both local and visitors. Plans are in progress for improvements which will enable nature lovers to reach the water level of Fall Creek gorge during the coming year. Planting of broad leaf evergreens added much to the beauty of Fall Creek last spring.

#### POWER PLANT AND TRANSMISSION LINES

Outside of regular Power Plant and Transmission Line maintenance, this department has relighted Schoellkopf Field, installed several new street lights and

additional service to buildings.

Construction on the tie line between the Hydro-Electric Plant and the new Steam-Electric Plant was started April 1, 1940. This work included rebuilding switchboard in the Hydro-Electric Plant, rebuilding the pole line from the Hydro Plant to Rand Hall and from Barton Hall to the Heating Plant. From Rand Hall to Barton Hall, a six-duct underground conduit has been installed to replace the present pole line.

#### CENTRAL HEATING PLANT

The Bailey Meter Company combustion control system, started and referred to in 1938-39 report, was extended by adding a stoker control to the #1 boiler,

resulting in correcting the somewhat erratic action of the boiler and increasing its evaporation per pound of coal by approximately 1.2%.

As a result of the improvement in the #1 boiler operation, stoker controls were purchased for and will be operating on #2, 6 and 7 boilers this fall. However, we cannot expect as marked an improvement in these units as in the case of #1 boiler

The study by Professor F. O. Ellenwood of the Engineering College of the economy of adding steam driven electric generators to the Heating Plant has resulted in the purchase of a 300 K.W. back pressure turbine and a 300 K.W. bleeder turbine together with their auxiliaries including superheaters for #6 and #7 boilers, a condenser and a cooling tower. These machines should be in operation by late summer or early fall.

During the past year the underground system of the Upper Campus was extended to the new Horse Barn and to the Federal Nutrition Laboratory. The load of the Federal Laboratory is expected to increase as buildings are added.

#### ARBORETUM

The sea wall at Forest Home has been about 75% completed, excavation for the last 175 feet being now under way. Continuous quarry operations have enabled the masonry work to progress to a point at which the remaining gravel in the bed of the stream can now be placed behind the wall.

Other Arboretum activities include road and path construction, planting trees and shrubs, nursery work, composting top soil, gathering specimen plants, grading

areas preparatory to planting, etc.

The present enrollment is about 154. Expectation of abandonment of the Camp by the government caused the enrollment to fall off seriously during the spring and early summer.

#### WATER WORKS

During the past year a weir with a float indicator was installed in the mixing basin of the plant to indicate the rate of flow of raw water, weather stripping was placed on all windows as an aid to heating the plant, and a drinking fountain was installed. Small amounts of sodium aluminate were fed at short intervals to aid coagulation of the water and were found to be of considerable use under certain conditions.

An exhaustive study of filtering media has been made and one of the filters will be rebuilt next year based on the results of the investigation. Details will ap-

pear in the 1940-41 report.

During the year work was started on metering all domestic consumption on the Lower Campus. The Trustees authorized a capital expense for 44 meter installations. The sizes range from  $\frac{5}{6}$ " to 4" and, with the closing of Summer School, work will proceed on those installations which had to be deferred. There remain about ten meters to be installed.

University water has been piped to the Johnny Parson Club from the Balch Hall main, a new 6" service has replaced an old one to Hoy Field and Bacon Cage, an 8" main has been placed leading from the 12" reservoir distribution main eastward to the McGowan House and a steamer hydrant was installed on this line for

fire protection.

Construction of the University Golf Course necessitated extension of water mains in that direction; accordingly, connections were made to the Forest Home system near the Bool Dam and 935 feet of 10" main were laid to the top of the hill on Kline Road, from which point there will eventually be a connection to the Balch Hall main. From this above mentioned point about 770 feet of 6" main conducts the water to the Golf Course pump house where pressure is boosted and the water is forced through more than a mile of smaller pipes to the various tees and greens.

Construction of the Federal Nutrition Laboratory necessitated a 6" service to

that building, also two new steamer hydrants.

Many minor operations such as repairing leaks, replacing defective valves, changing hydrants, etc., have been made throughout the year. No serious breaks have occurred.

Domestic water consumption of the State Colleges increased about 9.4% over the previous year, and that of the Endowed Colleges decreased about one-half of 1%.

The water consumption, showing an increase of 2.5% over the past year, has

been as follows:

#### U. S. REGIONAL PLANT, SOIL AND NUTRITION LABORATORY

The second unit of this project, which will eventually comprise three sections, was completed by Spence Brothers of Michigan during July 1940 at a cost of \$76,600.00. The structure connects with and harmonizes with the first unit completed in 1939 at the east end of Tower Road. The unit is 40 ft. by 80 ft., 4 stories high and is constructed of brick, concrete and cinder block with a steel frame. The fourth story is a standard greenhouse joining the fourth story of the first unit and will join the future third unit.

This section houses the service rooms, receiving room, Director's office, library, business offices, additional laboratories and work rooms. All preliminary work for both units, involving plans, specifications and engineering was done by this department. The contracts were let and the work supervised by the Federal

government.

#### ENGINEERING

Considerable topography has been taken on areas which have been changed due to construction; some of this has been mapped but more remains to be done. Layout work for construction has been a large item; estimates, property line surveys, etc., compose a large part of the remaining work. Meridian determinations have been made at points to the east, made necessary by the continual University expansion in that direction.

A further increase in the cost of Maintenance and Operation of 3.1% will be noted from the above figures over the year 1938-39. This has been the result mainly of increased appropriations for the purpose of putting the buildings and grounds in better condition. There has been, however, an increase of fuel consumption of 6.5% and the coal reserve which was allowed to reduce during the previous year was built up again during the past spring by approximately 1,500 tons.

Since the Exchange of Power Agreement between the New York State Electric and Gas Corporation and Cornell University went into effect in the year 1927–28, 21,744,200 K.W.H. have been furnished the Corporation in excess of the amount

received from the Corporation. Stated another way, we have furnished 6.12 times as much as we have received. However, operations during the current year have involved heavy purchases from the Corporation, seriously affecting this ratio. This is due to low production, 31% less than last year, because of low water.

According to the above statement showing receipts and disbursements on a calendar year basis on the Exchange of Power Agreement over a thirteen year period, there is a difference in favor of the New York State Electric and Gas Corporation of \$17,445.55.

The ratio in the Exchange of Power Agreement between the Cornell University Hydro-Electric Plant and the New York State Electric and Gas Corporation continued to operate during the year 1939–40 and shows, according to the above figures, 1,274,100 KWH furnished to and 1,325,900 received from the New York State Electric and Gas Corporation.

On the basis of the 10–1 agreement, there is a difference in favor of the Electric and Gas Corporation of 11,984,900 KWH.

A further increase in energy consumption of 13% has been recorded during the year 1939-40 in an effort to continue the improvement of general lighting conditions in addition to the installation of additional electrical equipment.

The total output of the two Hydro-Electric plants, inclusive of 1,325,900 KWH purchased from the New York State Electric and Gas Corporation, has been 5,157,500 KWH for the current year. Of this amount, 1,274,100 KWH have been furnished to the New York State Electric and Gas Corporation on the Exchange of Power Agreement, leaving a balance of 3,883,400 KWH, which, with the line losses of 362,579 KWH or 9.3% deducted, shows a total consumption of 3,520,821 KWH, in 1939–40, an increase of 13.5% over 1938–39.

The total generated by the two Hydro-Electric plants during the year 1939-40 was 3,831,600 KWH or 31.2% under the previous year.

During the period from May 1939 until January 1940 only 17.58 inches of rain fell as against a normal of 26.86 inches. This condition so depleted the flow of water in the creek that it was necessary to close operation of the Hull Mill plant from July until November completely. During the months of November and December it operated only 214 hours as against a normal of 1,456 hours and was closed down again through January. The main plant was operated from July to January at approximately one-third capacity.

The average cost of coal purchased during the year was \$3.93.

The increase shown of 6.7% in the cost of fuel consumed is mainly due to an increase in the consumption of 7.2% as against 11.2% increase in degree days. There is, however, an increase of  $\frac{1}{2}$  of 1% in the unit price of coal which may be attributed to the large amount of extra labor necessary in the unloading operation caused by the greater number of cars which arrived in a frozen condition.

The operation of the Heating Plant again this year has shown improvement. With an increase of 6.5% in coal consumption, 7.7% more steam has been produced with a ratio of pounds of steam per pound of coal increase of 1.2%. The consumption on the Lower Campus shows an increase of 5.2% while the Upper Campus records 4.9% with an increase in degree days of 11.2%. The increase in total consumption is 5.1%.

During the past year, a broken valve gland on the main steam line between the Plant and Manhole F, early in the winter, was responsible for the loss of a large amount of steam since it was impossible to shut the line off in order to make the necessary repair because of extreme temperatures. This condition was a major factor in the 11.3% increase in the Plant steam loss.

\* It will be noted that two different amounts are being used as fuel consumption at the Heating Plant. These figures are arrived at from two different sources, one from actual railroad weights and the other from hopper weights taken at the plant.

#### REPORT OF THE MANAGER OF PURCHASES

To the Treasurer:

The past fiscal year 1939-1940 has been notable principally for the international and political changes which have occurred. These have, of course, had their effect upon the business situation and both world and domestic markets. With the outbreak of the war in the Fall, many foreign sources of supply were completely cut off, involving difficulties in importation and increased cost of certain types of material which necessitated not only prompt action but a change in policy as far as the volume buying is concerned. The accumulation of commodities, however, was confined entirely to a selected group of items for which it was apparent regular sources of supply would be definitely terminated and no forward buying took place in anticipation of speculative price rises which proved to be temporary. As a result of this policy the total combined inventory of items in College Stores and Chemical Stores has remained practically stationary and no shortages of any needed supplies have occurred to date. With the continuation of the war and the elimination of foreign sources of supply, some substitutions may have to be made in the future. Such substitutions are now being investigated in order to be prepared for such an emergency if it occurs. Governmental regulation has had less effect on prices and buying policies than in the previous year, although certain classes of commodities are still subject to price regulation where competition is virtually eliminated.

The total volume of expenditures handled through the Purchasing Department increased slightly over the previous year and reached a total of \$1,306,675 which is a record expenditure since the Purchasing Department was established. The total number of orders issued was only slightly in excess of the previous year so that again the average expenditure per order has increased and now stands at

\$60.84.

The dollar volume of issues from College Stores has, during the year, shown an increase of over 50%, the figure for the previous year being \$182,500 as compared with \$279,400 for this last fiscal year. This unprecedented increase is due largely to the fact that College Stores has assumed not only the stocking of all Buildings and Grounds supplies but also acts as a clearing house through which purchases for Buildings and Grounds projects pass. It is also due to the fact that analyses have been made of purchases for the various service departments of the University. Items previously purchased in small quantities are now subject to regular stock procedure and purchased on a volume basis. The new Stores and Service Building which has been occupied a year and a half has so far justified its construction that plans have been made to build two additions which will accommodate the University Garage, the Electric Power Department, Carpenter Shop, Paint Shop and maintenance offices, as well as add to the storage facilities of College Stores a space sufficient to service these additional departments. This work is now under way and when completed the combined building will house all of the service and stores activities, removing them permanently from the academic buildings and the lower Campus. Plans are also under way to demolish the present wooden sheds along the side track and replace them with a more permanent storage building and lumber shed for the storage of carload material. Additional facilities for truck delivery will be necessary when these facilities are completed.

The Chemical Stores issues for the fiscal year amounted to \$35,600 as against \$31,800 the previous year. In addition to this the volume of issues to students was \$14,400. Due to the elimination of certain stock items and further standardization efforts, the Chemical Stores inventory has been reduced by approximately \$7700 during the past year. The stock of chemicals and glassware, however, has

remained adequate for the various uses of the University in spite of the difficulties in connection with certain foreign sources of supply on such items as microscope cover glasses and various chemicals. In some cases fairly heavy stocks were laid

in before supplies were cut off and prices advanced.

The University Print Shop has added to its equipment a folder, perforator and offset spray gun and plans are being made to install a vertical press which will be much faster in operation than the present presses and will supplement them, thus increasing production. The dollar volume of business increased from \$23,900 to \$25,600 and in addition to this, it was necessary for the Print Shop to have a very considerable amount of work done outside. It is planned, therefore, to increase the facilities not only by installing a new press but by taking over the East end of the present building for storage of paper and possible additional equipment in order to increase the service which this Shop can render to the various University departments.

The Typewriter Division continues to service an increased volume of typewriters, dictaphones and mimeographs and some other office machines and the total volume of business has increased slightly during the past year. This increased business has been taken care of without additional equipment or expense and this

Division is now operating on a self-supporting basis.

The University Messenger Service has continued to function efficiently during this past fiscal year and has rearranged its route and added several additional stops on its schedule. Approximately six hundred thousand pieces of mail are

handled by this service during the year.

All purchases on State appropriated funds for the Agricultural Experiment Station in Geneva have cleared through the Purchasing Department during this last fiscal year and this has involved 1267 orders, amounting to a little over \$57,000. Arrangements have been made so that during this next fiscal year all the purchases from other funds will also clear through the Purchasing Department, thus bringing the buying for the Geneva Experiment Station entirely under the jurisdiction of the Purchasing Department. The facilities of College Stores, Chemical Stores and the Print Shop are thus made available to the Experiment Station.

The relations between the Purchasing Department and the various State Departments in Albany, including the Division of Standards and Purchase, the State Education Department and the Department of Audit and Control have remained cordial and cooperative during the last fiscal year and procedure for the purchase of feed, printing and other supplies have been simplified to the advantage of all concerned. Both purchase and voucher forms for State use have been simplified, with consequent economies, and every effort is being made to

further simplify the procedure for the expenditure of State funds.

The participation of the Purchasing Department in the affairs of the Educational Buyers Association and its affiliate, the Educational and Institutional Cooperative Service, Inc. has been productive of savings of an appreciable degree during the past year and the advantages of the contacts provided through these Associations and that of the National Association of Purchasing Agents has been of particular value at a time when purchasing policies were being so largely affected by national and international affairs. Access to the opinions and advice of buyers for educational institutions as well as those in the industrial field has helped to clarify many of the perplexing problems which have come up during the year.

Following this report is a summary showing the number of requisitions handled, the number of purchase orders issued, the amount of expenditure through purchase orders, and the total amount of issues from the Storerooms and Duplicating Room. These figures do not include certain contracts for which purchase orders are not issued. Also attached are statements of orders placed for the State and Endowed Colleges and a summary of requisitions received during the year.



\$.033591 From July 17 to 22, 1939 the College of Home Economics cooperating with the New York State Departments of Education, and Health and Social Welfare, held a Nutrition Conference. Women attending were housed at Balch Halls and

722 University Avenue. School Superintendents and officers attending the summer conference "Facing the Problems of Youth" were housed at 516 and 722 University Avenue and Balch

Halls from August 2 to 4, 1939.
A Study-Conference Program for District Superintendents was held from April 10 to 13, 1940. Twenty-five men attending were housed in the Baker Group. Thirty-seven delegates attending the state meeting of the Parent Teachers' Association held at Martha Van Rensselaer Hall from April 15 to 19, 1940 were housed at 722 University Avenue and Balch Halls.

Thirty-five women attending the Conference in Child Development and Parent Education were accommodated at Balch Halls and 722 University Avenue. The Poultry Science Association held their meetings at Cornell from June 26

to 30. The guests and members attending were housed at Balch Halls.

The 4-H Club Congress convened at Cornell from June 24 to 27. Twelve hundred twenty-five boys and girls were housed in the dormitories. The girls occupied 5 East Avenue, 15 East Avenue, 516 and 722 University Avenue, Sage and Risley Halls. The boys lived at Cascadilla, North and South Baker Halls.

During the college year 246 students were regularly employed in the dining rooms of the dormitories and Willard Straight Hall receiving in return their board. In addition to this, 212 students were employed part time receiving a fixed wage per hour.

The apartment house at 520 Thurston Avenue was remodelled to house 38

women. These students obtain meals in the Risley Hall dining rooms.

In North Baker Hall and Baker Tower mastic tile floors were laid in 16 rooms and adjacent corridors. In Founders Hall new floors were laid in two rooms. These rooms were painted.

In Cascadilla Hall linoleum was laid on the 1st floor corridors of both the

north and south sides. The usual number of rooms were painted. Clothes closets

were built in rooms 201, 301 and 401.

The cottage at 308 Wait Avenue was painted.

At 5 East Avenue linoleum was laid in the rooms on the first and second floors.

In Balch Halls all the rooms on the 5th and 6th floors were painted or the walls washed.

In the Balch dining room department two electric glass washers were installed. New draperies were purchased for the Unit One dining room. The usual painting was done in the kitchens and storerooms. More stainless steel equipment has

been added for the kitchens and pantries. At Sage College the east balcony was rebuilt making two single rooms for students. Several rooms on the north and west sides of the building were insu-

lated. The usual painting of rooms was continued.

Both dining rooms at Sage were acoustically treated. The rooms were redecorated. New lights and venetian blinds were installed. The pantries were

painted. More stainless steel utensils were added including new coffee urns and a steam tilting kettle. An electrically operated water cooling system was installed.

In Risley Hall new ranges were installed in the kitchens and electric glass washer and an electrically operated water cooling system were installed. A portable silver burnisher has been added as well as more stainless steel equipment for the kitchen and pantry including new coffee urns.

The dining room furniture has been refinished. Boltalite trays have been

purchased for both the Sage and Risley dining rooms.

The usual number of study-bedrooms were redecorated.

At the Laundry two mushroom yoke presses were added, also the newest type handkerchief ironer. The outside of the building has been repaired and masonry work done where necessary.

The Food Storage building is almost completed. We hope to have the refrigeration and bakery equipment installed before the opening of college in Sep-

tember.

## REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE COMSTOCK PUBLISHING COMPANY, INCORPORATED

September 11, 1940

To the Treasurer:

It is gratifying to report that the affairs of the Comstock Publishing Company are in an extremely satisfactory condition. The gross sales for the year were nearly \$4,000 greater than for the previous year. This was largely due to more liberal advertising and especially to the sales of the new book, Conservation in the United States. The first edition of 3,500 copies of this work was exhausted in less than one year and a new printing of 5,000 copies with minor changes has been made. As this text has been adopted by more than 190 institutions it is one of the successful ventures of the Company.

Besides the above a second printing of 10,000 copies of the twenty-fourth edition of Mrs. Comstock's *Handbook of Nature-Study* has been ordered. The first printing was issued in February, 1939. During the year *An Introduction to Entomology* by J. H. Comstock was revised and the ninth edition was published in June. New printings were also issued of *The Physiology of Domestic Animals* by H. H. Dukes and *Trout Streams* by Paul R. Needham.

The first edition of Quayle, Insects of Citrus and Other Subtropical Fruits, published in 1938, has been nearly exhausted and a new printing of it is in preparation. A new book, *Plant Galls and Gall Makers* by E. P. Felt, will be published in October, 1940.

For several years the little work, Ways of the Six-Footed by Mrs. Comstock, has been out of print. This has been revised by Professor Herrick and has been more

adequately illustrated. It will be ready for the market next spring.

As in past years, the Comstock Publishing Company has had full responsibility for the housing and business of the University Press and has assumed a large share of its general expenses. In the last fiscal year the sales of the University Press tripled and consequently the duties of the staff of the Comstock Publishing

Company were added to materially.

At the end of the college year, 1939-40, Mr. Woodford Patterson retired from service as general manager of the Comstock Publishing Company and of the University Press. To fill this vacancy the Board of Directors of the Company which by action of the University Board of Trustees became the Board of Directors for the University Press, appointed William Stanley Schaefer manager both of the Comstock Publishing Company and of the University Press, his duties being as follows: To have the general responsibility for the conduct of the business, including the buying of supplies, securing help for carrying on the business of the Company and Press, advertising, and all business relations with authors, printing houses and engraving companies.

The Board of Directors also provided for room and equipment in the Company's building at 124 Roberts Place for Mr. Patterson who was appointed to aid the Manager in dealing with the literary form of the publications, preparation of

catalogues, advertising, etc.
On account of world conditions, sales in foreign lands are naturally somewhat restricted; but with the great home market and the assured sound management of the Company and the Press, their continued growth and importance seem guaranteed.

## CORNELL RESEARCH FOUNDATION, INC.

To the Board of Trustees of Cornell University:

During the fiscal year 1930–40 the Executive Committee, which is composed of all the directors of the Foundation that are resident in Tompkins County, met four times. From the Foundation's current income, the directors distributed \$3,300 to various departments of the University for research purposes. Patents covering Dr. Tressler's sherry and port wine processes were finally issued to the Foundation; also a patent covering an improved method of making Beta Lactose was received. Several interesting items are under study, and patent applications are being sought for a new staple, Alpha Lactose; a new method of canning cheese; refining maple syrup; manufacturing oxygen free milk; and for new arsenates. During the year two contracts were made—one for the use of the wine processes with the Pleasant Valley Wine Co. of Rheims, N. Y.—the other for the use of the honey process with the Finger Lakes Honey Producers Cooperative of Ithaca, N. Y. During the year, Mr. R. E. Treman resigned as president, and Mr. Sherman Peer was elected to that office.
